Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, information to the effect that, since the severe epidemic of yellow fever which raged in the city and harbour of Rio de Janeiro in 1888-9, there have been annual visitations of this terrible disease more or less intense in character, and that this year has proved no exception, the epidemic being perhaps among the most severe on record.

As the disease has proved very fatal amongst the shipping frequenting the harbour, it appears desirable that British sailing vessels should avoid the port as much as possible during the months of December, January, February, and March.
